#### The Fantastic Year of 2020: A Newly Sober AA's Perspective

"The only thing everyone seemed to agree on in 2020 was that they couldn't wait for it to end. From COVID-19 to Carol Baskin, there certainly was a lot of complaining. For me though, the year 2020 will forever be held in a different light. 2020 was the best year of my life. It was the year I got sober."

My name is Stephanie and I am an alcoholic. My sobriety date is February 10, 2020. After years of half-efforts availing nothing, I finally conceded that I cannot conquer alcohol on my own. I begrudgingly crawled back to a meeting. I got a sponsor. I got a homegroup. I had a Big Book and started using it. I was ready to do anything it took. Then, the pandemic came.

The last in person meeting I attended was *Ligonier Wednesday Night*. The topic, not coincidentally, was fear. Someone sharing said "am I going to lean into fear, or am I going to lean into faith". Those words resonated within me when our country went on lockdown.

In a few short weeks, online meetings were up and running all over our district. I was grateful to see the familiar faces from the rooms on my computer screen. For this alcoholic, very early in sobriety, it was miraculous; it was essential; it was lifesaving. I remember many people sharing in the early days of the quarantine, how hard they thought it would be to be for the newcomer during that time. I just kept thinking in horror, "What if I was still out there!?" How would my disease have surfaced when I was forced into isolation? Thanks to the miracles of this program, I didn't have to find out. I continued going to AA meetings on Zoom. I even found myself right at home at meetings I would never have attended otherwise. I went to meetings while I was at work, alone in my car, and in the comfort of my own home. This became my new program.

I was given opportunities not otherwise available. The countless leads online being the most impactful. Many of the women in our district told of her experience, strength and hope at the 3 o'clock hand of AA meeting. My sponsor, grand sponsor, great grand sponsor, and great-great grand sponsor all gave their leads on Zoom. It was truly surreal. I attended a lead from *Crossing the River of Denial* and was inspired on a level that was unknown to me before. I learned so much. Even more importantly, I took advantage of these opportunities for fellowship in my fragile early days of recovery.

My AA world became so much bigger and brighter than I ever could have imagined. I owe my life today to Alcoholics Anonymous. I owe my sobriety and my peace of mind to those virtual meetings. It has been rightly declared "If only our forefathers could only see us now!" So far, our Fellowship has shown that there is a way to carry the message no matter what the circumstances. AA went to any length to reach the still sick and suffering alcoholic. For that, I am eternally grateful. Especially in the year 2020.
